Example 3 - Communication from Support Person to Teaching Staff

UNSW's <u>Division of Equity Diversity and Inclusion</u> website offers resources. You can also contact <u>Access, Equity and Inclusion</u> for assistance. I would also suggest the website <u>TransHub</u> , an online information platform for trans and gender diverse people, their loved ones, allies and health professionals. This website explains key terms and offers examples of language and pronouns.
As a staff member at UNSW, you may also find that you need to address concerns or behaviour of other students in relation to the gender affirmation. It is important to role model supportive behaviour and to use the correct pronouns when addressing the student and expect others to do so. The student is, by law, able to use toilets and facilities which align to their affirmed gender.
