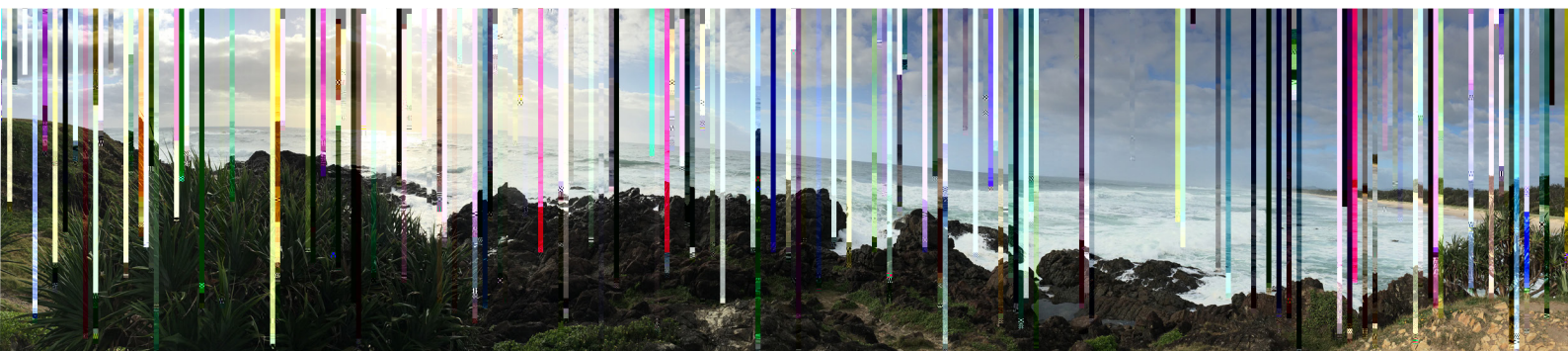


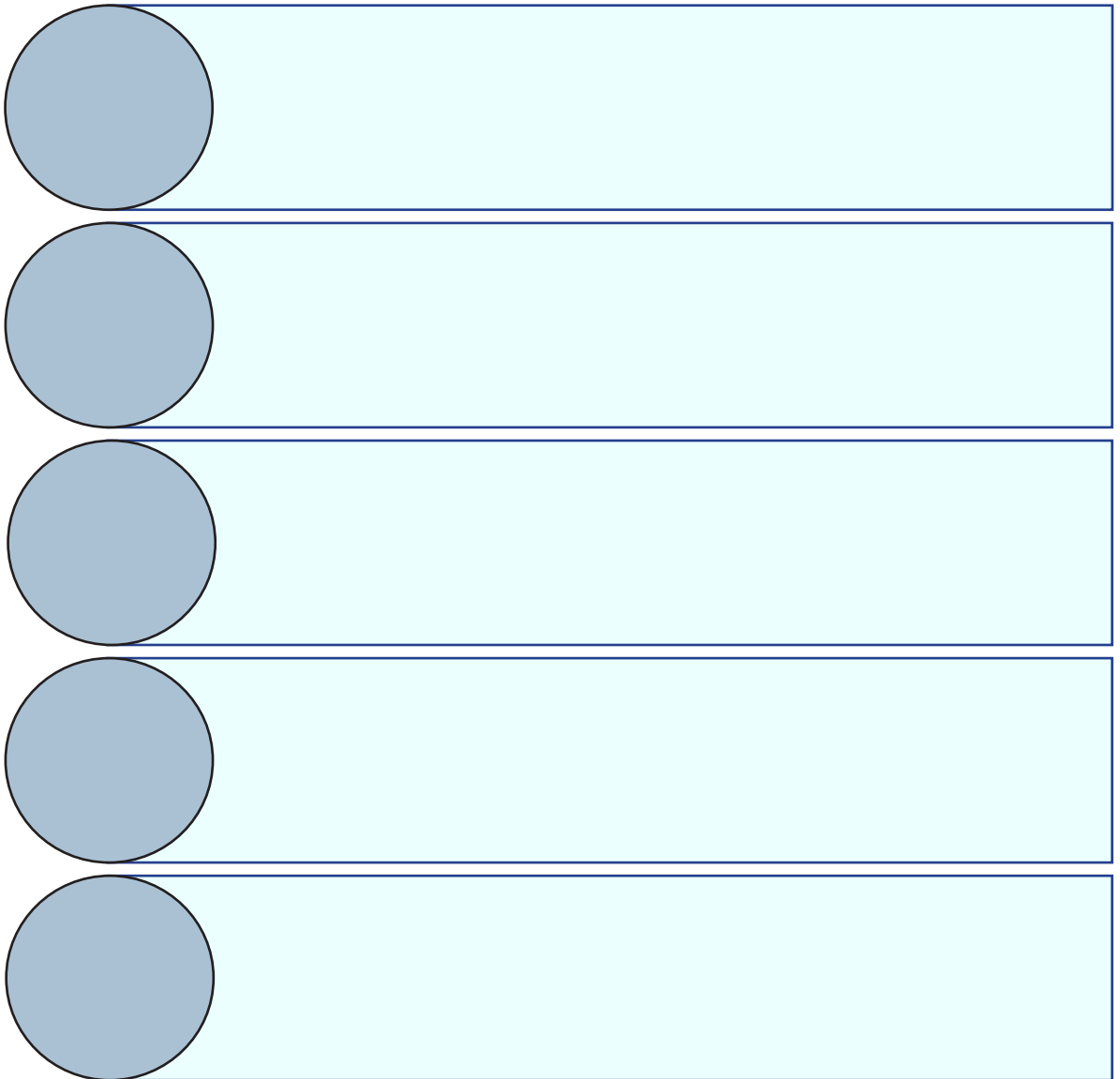
What are the hazards?

The MyCoast NSW Study was broad in nature, both in terms of geographic data collection (NSW coast-wide) and subject matter: hazard understanding, risk perception, understanding and preference of coastal management options and sources of learned information. There are a number of ways that similar studies in the future could be conducted to build upon knowledge of coastal communities' understandings and perceptions, detailed in Figure 1.
