PEP6 (Clinical) follows from earlier PEP courses and provides the f nal stage of training in the

practical component of the clinical program. At this stage candidates are expected to develop further autonomy in their clinical practice. In PEP6 candidates are required to complete a supervised placement in one external f eld placement setting of at least 167 hours. Activities undertaken during placement typltallg include client work, supervision, placement administrative responsibilities and client preparations. Placement hours typically extend beyond the standard term period. Additional hours may also be required to demonstrate suf cient clinical competencies. This is a Workplace Integrated Learning (WIL) course.

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The aim of the course is to further develop and strengthen the Clinical Psychology competencies of candidates, which is achieved through the active participation in client work and regular supervision at one external placement setting, and training through clinical workshops.

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PSYC7235 is a pre-requisite for this course.
